



Looped and Knotted

Weaving-in Guide

Finishing your crochet with love and confidence.

Why Weave in Ends?

Weaving in ends secures your work, prevents unraveling, and gives your finished project a neat, polished look. It's the final stitch in your story - and it matters!

What You'll Need:

- Yarn needle (also called a tapestry needle)
- Scissors
- Your finished project

Step 1: Thread your yarn tail into the needle. Use a blunt-tip yarn needle and fold the yarn to slide it through easily.

Step 2: Weave in on the wrong side of your work.

Step 3: Follow the direction of your stitches. Weave through the top loops, around post stitches, or into the base - mimicking the path of your stitches to blend in.

Step 4: Change direction at least once. Go in one direction for about 1-2 inches, then turn and go back the other way. This locks the yarn in place.

Step 5: Trim the tail close. Once your end is secure, snip the extra yarn close to the fabric - carefully!

Tips for Success

- For **single crochet**, weave through the top of the stitches.
- For **double crochet**, weave under the "posts" (vertical parts of the stitch)
- Don't pull too tight - you want the fabric to stay flat.
- Always weave ends into **similar color sections** for best camouflage
